Annual Kick-off Event

Our annual kick-off event for this year's Healey season will be on **Saturday, March 27th**. So, mark your calendars and plan on attending. It's time to dust off the Healey and get that engine started. Of course, your other car is always welcome too. After all, our meetings are about friendship and having fun. We will begin by having lunch at the Bay Area's famous **Max's Café**, at their San Ramon location, which is right off the 680 freeway. Following lunch we will caravan to the **Blackhawk Auto Museum** (which is only a few minutes away) for a private tour of those other wonderful driving machines.

Plan to arrive at Max's around 11:00 AM on Saturday, March 27th. To help make the lunch affordable for everyone, the club is subsidizing the lunch and your cost will be a nominal \$10 per head. Pay Lee with cash or check at the event.

Directions to Max's in San Ramon. The address is 2015 Crow Canyon Place, San Ramon, CA 94583. Exit 680 at Crow Canyon Rd and head east. (That's a left turn off the exit if going southbound and a right turn off the exit if going northbound.) Go to Crow Canyon Road (first intersection), turn left and Max's will be on your right. There is a Starbucks in the center for those who arrive early or need that extra hit in the morning.

The spectacular Carrera PanAmericana—the epic 2,135-mile road race launched to mark the completion of the PanAmerican Highway—celebrates its 60th anniversary in 2010. More than 20 people perished before it was canned in '55, and Cobra creator Carroll Shelby was lucky to survive this Mexican madness. After co-driving a Healey at Bonneville, the Texan was invited to share a 100S on the Carrera.



"We took two cars to Tuxtla Gutierrez," says Shelby, "one for Roy Jackson-Moore and I to drive. We got to the start too late for practice, but did run the route backwards from Mexico City to Tuxtla. I remember lots of strange signs that crews had painted in yellow on the road to warn drivers what was coming next, but we figured the signs were misleading and best ignored.

"When the race started, with me driving the first half between Tuxtla and Oaxaca and Roy the second half, things didn't work out well at all. Neither of us felt happy—in truth, we were both as nervous as cats. In the end we made it a solo effort, with the other flying to the next stop. Jackson-Moore never got his solo stint due to Shelby's scary off: "I started racing with those big Lincolns when I came around a corner too fast and there was a huge rock in the way. I went end over end four or five times like a daring young man on the flying trapeze, only a lot more painful. The marker stone went through the metal tonneau and a couple of wheels were torn off."

Shelby was lucky, but badly hurt: "I had contusions, a shattered elbow and cuts you couldn't even count. I lay there for six or seven hours before the road was reopened, but the Indians were kind and kept offering me strong beer."

Shelby shared the ambulance with Borgward driver Franz Hammenich, who had severe burns, and they finally made it to Puebla: "The doctor told me to get back to Texas and find a specialist because my arm was badly broken, but the authorities had other ideas." Shelby had signed for the car, so he was responsible for its return to the US: "The officials wouldn't release the car, so I was stuck in Mexico City. Eventually a Mexican friend appeared with two wheels that he claimed were found way down the mountain!"

Back in Dallas, Shelby's arm wasn't healed until August '55, but that didn't stop him racing with a GRP cast. The 100S, rebuilt and repainted green, survives in Australia.

Surviving Belarus


I knew I was in for a cold assignment, but I accepted it anyway. The US Agency for International Development wants to spend some money in the agricultural sector here, and it was my job to figure out what to do and how to do it so they can start by this summer. But I digress to some interesting and bizarre stuff about Minsk—the capital—and Belarus. The population of Minsk is about 2 million.

Since this newsletter is automotive in theme, I intended to write about cars. That didn't work out because the automotive scene can be described in one word—boring. All I saw was nondescript sedans and vans—universally filthy from the snow slush. You might be interested to know that Belarus is so cold that people start their cars by yelling MUSH!

Belarus is about the size of Kansas, is situated between Poland and Russia, and has a population of 10 million. The government is an “elected dictatorship;” it remains closer to the old Soviet model than any of the other former Soviet-sphere nations. There is no private land ownership, the media is controlled by government, and the government controls about 70% of the economy. Government even owns the jewelry business; there are almost no private jewelry stores in Belarus. And sometimes it is so cold that the politicians have to put their hands in their own pockets.

Belarus was severely affected by the Chernobyl disaster because the wind carried radiation northwest from Ukraine. About 16% of agricultural land had to be taken out of production because of contamination. Sometimes it's so cold that people stop complaining about the radioactive steam emanating from manholes.

Belarus has two armies—a conventional army and another to move snow. The Snow Army must be one of the greatest job creation programs ever invented. In Minsk, small tractors are seemingly everywhere with plows, buckets, and roller brushes. Once the critical areas have been cleaned they move to uncritical areas, and when those are done they shovel the fog. When it's cold and sunny the snow workers' shadows sometimes freeze to the pavement and they can't move.

Cold weather requires warm clothes. Every public place from offices to restaurants devotes a significant amount of space to coat racks, boot scrapers, and throw rugs. I have never seen such beautiful fur coats as the women wear; they are absolutely stunning. Nobody throws eggs at a fur coat here. Fur coats are not made in Belarus—they come from Turkey or someplace with lower wages. Minsk even has the equivalent of Furs R Us—a three-story outlet on the outskirts of the city featuring all things furry.

Almost every morning I walked 15 minutes from the hotel to the office; the temperature never exceeded 12°F. When leaving the hotel one morning it was so cold that I had to kick a hole in the air just to get outside. I walked through a park and observed non-migrating water fowl squabbling over a bit of liquid water in the creek (no joke).

I love to visit outdoor markets—but not when the temperature is 12°F. The experience was almost surreal. Just imagine people spending the day tending their market stalls and customers shopping in that temperature! A fruit vendor told me that citrus could withstand temperature down to 10°F, but below that it would freeze. One market consisted of more than a hundred shipping containers used as market stalls, lined up in rows. It was so cold they sold milk by the slice.

Minsk has modern indoor shopping malls and supermarkets, a superb public transportation system, and some wonderful people. I hear that they even have a summer. I will always

remember it as the only place I have ever been where restaurants charge extra for sugar for your coffee. The morning I left the temperature was -6°F, and two days later reached a brain-numbing -22°F. It's good to be home.

Making sure your Healey is dependable



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AUTOVINO

Drive a fancy car, sip some vintage wine and smoke an expensive cigar. For many, that's not a bad way to spend a day. And in Menlo Park, a new business on Constitution Drive off the Bayfront Expressway called AutoVino caters to people with a taste for all three. It's a storage facility for luxury automobiles, cigars and wine. But to co-founder Buff Giurlani, Autovino is much more than that—a club, of sorts, where local car aficionados can come to take their luxury or high-performance vehicles for a spin, then sit back with their buddies, cigar and wine in hand.

The "anchor" of this business is vehicle storage. The building has precision climate control. Special double-insulation and four HVAC systems maintain consistent atmospheric conditions to preserve fine finishes and prevent damage due to sudden temperature changes. A special dust control system continually filters air, while advanced humidity control helps protect the natural oils in leather and help maintain the integrity of seals and other fittings. Air supply is controlled air by means of a trap door system for car entry and exit that prevents outside air from entering the building.

AutoVino will design a program for you to ensure that your car always receives optimum care. In addition to 24/7 access to your vehicle, membership services include concierge airport service, vehicle transport, monthly engine start up, battery trickle charge, tire pressure monitoring, and tire rotation to avoid flat spots. Backup power generation, hand towing of vehicles within the facility, and a 24-hour video surveillance provide an extra measure of protection. AutoVino also has climate-controlled wine storage with a capacity of 6,000 cases in wood-paneled lockers. Next to the car showroom is a large glassed-in area where Woodside Vineyards will produce its award winning wine as of February 2010.

The showroom currently has a lounge area with leather couches and a coffee table full of car books and magazines. The VCSims racing simulator allows guests to hit speeds that are illegal on the streets. Another room, with leather chairs, a TV and a sophisticated ventilation system, is the cigar lounge.

LODI WINE TOUR


SATURDAY, APRIL 24, 2010

Want to watch some grapes grow and taste some delicious wine along the way? Come join us for this incredible journey through delta roads for a tour through California's oldest and most prolific grape growing region. Bring a picnic lunch to enjoy under the Valley Oak trees.

- Meet at McDonald's parking lot in **Rio Vista** on Hwy 12 (300 State Highway 12, Rio Vista, CA 94571-1437)
- There is also a gas station there to top off your tank.
- Wineries charge \$5 – \$10 per person for wine tasting

We will tour three to four local wineries with a lunch stop at a local park filled with beautiful shade trees, Japanese garden and zoo. There is an entry fee of \$5.00 per car. We will finish with some host-provided refreshments before sending you back home by mid-afternoon.



Lodi produces more wine than Napa and Sonoma combined. Some of America's most popular wines are made there. Mondavi, Gallo, Sebastiani, Glenn Ellen, Sutter Home and many other well known wines are grown and produced in Lodi.

The first commercial vineyard was established by George West in 1853 and he built the El Pinal Winery in 1858. By the late 1880 farmers embraced the Tokay grape as a versatile table grape with eye catching flame color. It is very distinctive to the Lodi region. The Tokay is a wonderful table grape, but can also be fermented into wine, distilled into brandy or fortified into ports and sherries.

Prohibition actually helped the Lodi growers. Under the Volstead Act, home winemaking was allowed and the demand for wine grapes actually increased. Thousands of railcars left Lodi each harvest full of Zinfandels, Tokays and Alicantes. In 1933 when Prohibition was repealed, the Lodi vintners didn't miss a step and began producing dessert wines.

The Lodi region transitioned in the 1960's to producing quality varietal wines preferred today. They produce premium, award winning wines that are enjoyed around the world today. Many of the wineries are 5th & 6th generation owned and operated. Come enjoy the personal touch and friendly atmosphere of Lodi winemakers.


