Details about these events will appear in the newsletter as they approach.




The Eliminator

It all started in June of 1959. As a 19 year-old I had a good, dependable job as a linotype operator in Berkeley and decided that I could afford a new car; I was specifically looking for a "sports car." I drove a number of different sport cars— MG, Triumph, Corvette and Jaguar, but they did not peak my interest. At El Cerrito BMC I test-drove a Healey—not the fastest car but the exhaust tone and the way the car felt overall led me inside to talk to the salesman.

While the salesman was "working up the numbers" I spied what was known in printing parlance as a "mat" from which a lead mold can be made for printing.





It announced the July, 1959 introduction of The New 1960 Austin Healey 3000, with front disc brakes and

MORE horsepower. I had the salesman cancel the 100-6 car order in favor of the 3000. I picked up the car on July 5, 1959; HBT7-L/940 was mine. It was Healey Blue with blue trim and hood. Since my intention was to race the car (drag racing, that is), I ordered it without wire wheels or overdrive.

The notoriously weak low gear teeth gave me fits for months. The slightest clash meant a new layshaft. The first three were covered by warranty; the fourth and last one is still in the transmission in perfect condition. The car was a daily driver from 1959 until late 1961. Since the car was a proven winner (and I was having too much fun), I decided to take the car off the streets and focus all efforts on racing. The car was rebuilt to legal stock specifications with a .060" overbore, all reciprocating parts balanced, and 2" HD8 carbs. An unusual locking differential was located in the late 1960's and installed, as well as an extremely low set of gears found in England.

Through the years the car acquired over a hundred first place trophies, and a second place in class at the prestigious Oakland Roadster Show. Due to rule changes the car was retired by 1973. By this time it had acquired 6 world records, 24 state records in California, Nevada, Washington and Oregon, and the title of being the world's fastest-accelerating stock Austin Healey at 14.8 seconds



and over 94 mph in the quartermile. Time has not been kind as the car now requires a lot of TLC to bring it back to its original glory. That would be a rewarding challenge for a new owner.





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It's True: Premium Gasoline is a Lot Like Male Enhancement Drugs

The things I do for this blog in the name of personal finance.

One day last month I got into a lunchtime conversation at work with a contractor who tried to convince me he had good reasons for putting premium gasoline in his Toyota Corolla, the biggest of which was that he got better gas mileage. I found that a bit hard to believe—but more on that in a second.

For the record, Consumer Reports notes that using premium gas in an engine that is designed to run on regular does NOT improve performance.

Unlike my contractor friend, I think most people understand that premium gasoline is generally meant for use by high performance cars and the occasional Sherman tank. Still, in 2007 the market share of premium gas was almost 10 percent.

I don't know about you but, regardless of how you calculate fuel economy, one out of every ten cars I see on the road aren't high performance vehicles—or Sherman tanks for that matter—so anecdotal evidence suggests a lot of people still believe in the magical powers of premium gasoline.

In fact, the magical powers that allow premium gasoline to turn a Toyota Corolla into a 540-hp Shelby GT500 is eerily similar to the claims of those male enhancement drugs that promise to turn us average Joes into superhuman love machines that would make even the late great Barry White envious. I mean, just look at the evidence:

Premium Gasoline	Male Enhancement Drugs
Better gas mileage	Improved energy
Better performance	More stamina
A better engine via	A better, um, "engine" yia
improved durability	improved firmness, fullness

But I digress. Let me go back to the contractor who swears he gets better gas mileage.

In addition to prolonging the life of his engine, this guy swears premium gas gives him an extra three miles per gallon too. Assuming he gets 40 miles per gallon, that would result in an improvement of only 7.5 percent, which is very close to the mark-up for premium gas anyway. Fine.


So just for grins I recently completed my own month-long experiment using only premium gasoline in my 1997 Honda Civic. I already had plenty of gas mileage data using regular gas from a previous analysis I did of my new work commute. For the record, I was averaging 40 miles per gallon using regular gasoline over a roughly twomonth period. The results? Well, over the past month I averaged one mpg *less* (39 mpg) using the premium gaso-

line and paid an additional \$6.44 over that period for the privilege. Talk about feeling like a chump.

I'll bet a lot of suckers people who bought those magic pills felt the same way after they finally, er, measured their results too.

The lesson here is don't buy into the hype of thinking that just because something cost more it has to be better. Premium gasoline is intended for use on a very narrow niche of cars. If you aren't sure what type of fuel your car should be using, check your owner's manual.

The odds are that the manufacturer probably recommends good ol' regular 87 octane gasoline.


Need an excuse to drive Healev? your Our "cousins" to the south are holding their annual California Healey Week May
