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

This year's tour began in Auburn from the Holiday Inn Express, and headed up Hwy 49 to Cramer Road. We turned off Cramer Road on to a private road (Fawnridge Rd.) headed for the Fawnridge Winery which was started in 2002 and is owned and operated by Stewart & Stephani Perry. The Perry's have been avid wine

lovers for thirty years. After living in North Lake Tahoe for fifteen years they moved to Auburn in 1989. Upon learning that local grape growers were bringing back the grape and wine industry as it was during the historic Placer County Gold Rush era, they decided to develop vineyards on their property. With the help of friends they planted Barbera and Syrah in the summer of 2002. They are personally involved in every aspect of the vineyard management and wine making process. After the wine tasting and purchasing some wine for later consumption, we headed out the same way we came in.



Once we got back to Hwy 49 we took a left turn and headed for Wolfe Road and proceeded into Grass Valley.

After stopping for some gas, we headed up Hwy 20/49 going through the Tahoe National Forest headed for Interstate 80. We took the Norden/ Soda Springs exit and headed east past the Sugar Bowl Skiing area to our next stop which was Donner Lake. We stopped at the West End Beach area and found some picnic tables to relax and eat our lunch. Departing from the West End Beach we headed east driving along the north side of Donner Lake. Once we got back to the entrance to Hwy 80 we headed west back to the Norden/Soda Springs exit and drove along the old Hwy 40 headed for the Rainbow Tavern & Lodge.

The Rainbow Tavern & Lodges history dates back to the late1800's with the original structure being built in the late 1800's. Originally used as a stagecoach stop, Rainbow Tavern & Lodge was expanded in the 1920's by Mr. Herschel Jones. You can see the progress by looking at the pine logs in the ceilings. The two different shapes of the logs show where the extension was made. Also, step into the bar area and notice the window that used to be the exterior.

Today, the lodge retains its history very well. With its stone walls, hand-hewn beams, and knotty pine walls, it is a great place to return to a quieter and slower time. There are photographs on the walls throughout to see all of the history of the Lodge and the surrounding area. There is no WiFi, no TV's and the bathroom is down the hall, but no one seemed to mind.

Once all that was done, we headed back to the bar area and the fun began... The band Dream & The Dreamer (Doug Caldwell & Ray Laflin) played some of our favorite music while we danced and sang the night away. It was a Great Day and we all had a Great Time... The cars performed flawlessly and so did we...

After a good night sleep and a Wonderful Brunch provided by the Lodge, a few of us headed for the little town of Washington to enjoy one of their famous Bloody Mary's. The Blue Angels have flown over 10 different aircraft in the team's 69 year history. Originally, the team flew four aircraft in the signature "Diamond" formation and expanded to six aircraft to showcase both the diamond and solos high performance capability as well as the precision formation flying taught to all Naval Aviators. Today, the squad-ron flies the Boeing F/A-18 Hornet and the Lockheed Martin C-130 Hercules. The Blue Angels are painted Blue & Yellow in the world-wide recognizable paint scheme. The precision flying team put on an unforgettable 45-minute show, which was viewable from the backyard of Marty's house.

Navigating the twisty, up and down streets of hillside Sausalito is a challenge, as well as finding parking near Marty's house, but we all managed to get there for the afternoons party.

Socializing, exploring the three-level house, and watching the air show were the principal activities of the afternoon, not to mention partaking of wine from Rams Gate, Testarossa, and Rombauer wineries. A Great Story about early times in the Truckee area... Provided by: Bob Altieri

TRUCKEE, Calif. — Western stagecoach companies were big business in the latter half of the 19th century. In addition to passengers and freight, stages hauled gold and silver bullion as well as mining company payrolls. Stage robbery was a constant danger and bandits employed many strategies to ambush a stagecoach. Thieves rarely met with much resistance from stage drivers, since they had passenger safety foremost in mind. The gang was usually after the Wells Fargo money box with its valuable contents. Passengers were seldom hurt, but they were certainly relieved of their cash, watches and jewelry. Before the completion of the transcontinental railroad over Donner Pass in 1868, the only transportation through the Sierra was by stage. Rugged teamsters held rein over six wild-eyed horses as they tore along the precipitous mountain trails. The stagecoaches were driven by skilled and fearless men who pushed themselves and their spirited horse se to the limit.

One of the most famous drivers was Charles Darkey Parkhurst, who had come west from New England in 1852 seeking his fortune in the Gold Rush. He spent 15 years running stages, sometimes partnering with Hank Monk, the celebrated driver from Carson City. Over the years, Pankhurst's reputation as an expert whip grew. From 20 feet away he could slice open the end of an envelope or cut a cigar out of a man's mouth. Parkhurst smoked cigars, chewed wads of tobacco, drank with the best of them, and exuded supreme confidence behind the reins. His judgment was sound and pleasant manners won him many friends.

One afternoon as Charley drove down from Carson Pass the lead horses veered off the road and a wrenching jolt threw him from the rig. He hung on to the reins as the horses dragged him along on his stomach. Amazingly, Parkhurst managed to steer the frightened horses back onto the road and save all his grateful passengers.

NO PATIENCE FOR CROOKS - During the 1850s, bands of surly highwaymen stalked the roads. These outlaws would level their shotguns at stage drivers and shout, "Throw down the gold box!" Charley Parkhurst had no patience for the crooks despite their demands and threatening gestures.

The most notorious road agent was nicknamed "Sugarfoot." When he and his gang accosted Charley's stage, it was the last robbery the thief ever attempted. Charley cracked his whip defiantly, and when his horses bolted, he turned around and fired his revolver at the crooks. Sugarfoot was later found dead with a fatal bullet wound in his stomach.

In appreciation of his bravery, Wells Fargo presented Parkhurst with a large watch and chain made of solid gold. In 1865, Parkhurst grew tired of the demanding job of driving and he opened his own stage station. He later sold the business and retired to a ranch near Soquel, Calif. The years slipped by and Charley died on Dec. 29, 1879, at the age of 67. A few days later, the Sacramento Daily Bee published his obituary. It read;

"On Sunday last, there died a person known as Charley Parkhurst, aged 67, who was well-known to old residents as a stage driver. He was in early days accounted one of the most expert manipulators of the reins who ever sat on the box of a coach. It was discovered when friendly hands were preparing him for his final rest, that Charley Parkhurst was unmistakably a well-developed woman!"

NOT LIKE OTHER MEN, ER, WOMEN? Once it was discovered that Charley was a woman, there were plenty of people to say they had always thought he wasn't like other men. Even though he wore leather gloves summer and winter, many noticed that his hands were small and smooth. He slept in the stables with his beloved horses and was never known to have had a girlfriend. Charley never volunteered clues to her past. Loose fitting clothing hid her femininity and after a horse kicked her, an eye patch over one eye helped conceal her face. She weighed 175 pounds, could handle herself in a fistfight and drank whiskey like one of the boys.

It turns out that Charley's real name was Charlotte Parkhurst. Abandoned as a child, she was raised in a New Hampshire orphanage unloved and surrounded by poverty. Charlotte ran away when she was 15 years old and soon discovered that life in the working world was easier for men. So she decided to masquerade as one for the rest of her life. The rest, as they say, is history. Well, almost....

There is one last thing. On November 3, 1868, Charlotte Parkhurst cast her vote in the national election, dressed as a man. She became the first woman to vote in the United States, 52 years before Congress passed the 19th amendment giving American women the right to vote.



Member Biography - Mike Naughton

Mike Naughton is a retired airline captain who has lived on the peninsula for the past forty years. When he's not out driving his Austin Healey, he's under it checking for leaks.

The year was 1967. I was a 26-year-old Navy lieutenant based on the U.S.S. Kearsarge, docked at the North Island Naval Air Station in San Diego Bay. At that time the U.S. government would allow servicemen to take delivery of a European car, duty-free if you were abroad for six months or more - a benefit that I took full advantage of following both of my overseas deployments. A 1965 MGB in British Racing Green was waiting for me upon return of my first cruise aboard the U.S.S. Bennington. I drove that car for nine months, top down the entire time. When it came time to ship out again, I sold the MGB to my good friend and soon-to-be best man. Waiting dockside upon my return from my second cruise was a red 1967 Austin Healey 3000, purchased for \$3,000.



Following my discharge from the Navy in December of 1967, my life-long journey with the Healey began with a cross-country drive to my new job in New York City. I made the beautiful drive through the Western United States without issue, until the electric fuel pump failed at the Colorado-Nebraska border. I spent the next 15 hours driving at 30 mph, limping through all 455 miles of the state of Nebraska, somehow arriving at the British Motor Car dealership in Lincoln in one piece. On the East Coast the Healey performed magnificently, save for a single flat tire. During the repair the Healey slipped its jack. In anger I hurled the now vintage AH Shelly jack across a muddy field, never to be seen again.

In the early 1970s, still single and still driving the Healey, I returned to San Francisco. In 1974 I was married, and my Healey, now *our* Healey, was used as our wedding getaway car. Time flies - marriage, children, career, and before I knew it my daily driver was suddenly a collectible. I joined the Austin Healey club, got my picture taken with Donald Healey and tucked my car away into the garage, collecting miles sparingly. Over the years the oxidized paint, dents, scratches and rust added up. With little time, energy, or money to address these problems, the Healey began to show its age.

Days turned to years, and in an instant it was 2013. "Dad, can I use the Healey for my wedding getaway car?" The next generation breathed new life into my once daily-driver and the saga continued. In Sacramento, I found Brian Moore Restorations. With the clock ticking to my son's wedding, Brian agreed to refurbish and deliver the Healey under deadline. It was completed with no time to spare. All that was needed was a 100-mile drive up the coast to the ceremony. Thank God for old rags and duct tape, because the heater hose blew. Luckily no one was the wiser, with my son and his new wife in the backseat, and me at the wheel once again.

I'm 73-years-old now, and the adventures don't seem to stop. South, to the Morgan Hill British Car Show with a busted oil filter and three lost quarts; north, to the site of my wedding reception forty years past, with a failing generator and an all-downhill drive home to save the day. Just as it had some 45 years ago, dockside in San Diego, the Healey - now a family heirloom and in prime condition - waits eagerly for the next lifetime of adventures. In fact, I just returned from our latest outing, a cruise with my three-year-old grand-son, Max - his first Austin Healey ride. It doesn't get any better than that.
