In 1900 it was once again renamed, this time to the Alpine Hotel which it has carried to this day.

He was the editor of the National Magazine as well as our Newsletter editor for many years. I can remember many phone calls and faxes between John and my father, they would go back and forth and back and forth about the Tech Article for the Healey Highlights / Healey Magazine. He wanted them perfect for the magazine and wouldn't quit until they were just right.

Then one day in late 1998 Sandi Baker then president of Pacific Centre had a great idea let's host a Healey Meet in 2002 for the anniversary of the Austin Healey. So Sandi Baker, John, Lee Bardellini and I got together and went for it. John jumped in with both feet clear up to his neck with the same passion for the meet that he had for the Austin Healey. On one of our many trips to the Lake Tahoe area in planning for the meet, we had lost the original hotel and we were looking for a new hotel for the meet. While we were winding our way around the lake going from hotel to hotel, he came up with the theme for the meet. He suddenly said it's going to called "OPEN ROADS" to signify the long open roads that are going to be traveled to get to the meet.

He was always the tinkerer trying to make his car a little better and there seemed to be this friendly competition between him and Len Hartnett as to who had the most gauges in their car. He would always be the one that had that spare part that you needed to get your car running in one of those road side tech sessions. John may you now enjoy the Open Roads alongside Donald Healey and the rest of the Healey enthusiasts that are no longer with us.



# San Francisco Bay Model plus Drive: July 18

Located at 2100 Bridgeway in the north part of Sausalito, the San Francisco Bay/Delta Model was built in 1957 by the US Army Corps of Engineers as a tool to test the impact of proposed changes to the Bay and related waterways. The model is housed in a large 1.5 acre structure, and is a three-dimensional representation of the Bay and Delta and capable of simulating tides, currents, and river inflows. (Marty Allen who lives in Sausalito, did not take charge of the planning and construction; although he probably could have done it).

Our trip starts at the Bay model parking lot at 9:00/9.30 where Kim will have coffee and goodies. There are several signs on Bridgeway showing directions to the site. Our guided tour will begin at 11:00, so that should give us time to socialize or gaze at the Bay and sailboats. Also, if so inclined, we should have time to visit the restoration of a Tall Ship in the large tent just north of the parking lot. Like the Bay Model, admission is free.

After our estimated one hour tour of the Bay Model, we will leave Sausalito, head north on Highway 101 for about 30 minutes, exiting at the Lucas Valley Road turn-off, just north of Terra Linda. We will re-group, then head west on Lucas Valley Road for about 30 minutes to Nicasio. The road goes past Big Rock Ranch, part of the George Lucas Ltd. film complex, then after a few miles, past his Skywalker Ranch property which is behind large wooden gates on the right. (No, Lucas Valley was <u>not</u> named after George Lucas!). Continue through the Redwood trees, turn right at Nicasio Valley Road, arriving at the Rancho Nicasio restaurant where we will order from the daily menu. Kim says the fish tacos are worth the trip alone! Rumor has it that they are bringing in a special load of Tomales Bay oysters for the occasion!

After lunch, we can hang out in the bar, visit a local produce stand across from the old school house, go on self-guided tours to Pt. Reyes Station, Inverness, Pt. Reyes Lighthouse, Bodega Bay, etc., or head home. I will have maps showing these locations (without your home unless you think you might get lost), or you can rely on your navigator and/or GPS. Unfortunately, there are no wineries nearby, but there is the *Rouge et Noir* cheese factory to the north on Petaluma—Pt. Reyes Road, and many wineries in nearby Sonoma County.
